## Cashews in Ghana



"If you love cashews then the place to visit is Wenchi, in the Brong-Ahafo Region in Ghana, the Cashew Nut Capital'.

Wenchi is home to a warm, dry climate, ideal for growing cashews and for this reason many people have flocked to this area to start cashew farming.

Gloria is a widow with four daughters. Some years ago, her husband, a former army officer, together with two colleagues purchased a sizeable plot of land not far from Wenchi. Sadly, her husband passed away three years ago and left her with 12 acres of cashew nut trees to manage.

Growing cashew nuts takes more than simply leaving a tree to grow the cashew nut apple and harvesting the crop.

Growing cashew nuts requires spending money on organic fertiliser, organic insecticides and requires weeding a few times a year. Harvesting is laborious and labourers are expensive.

The spiral of not having enough money from the harvest to pay for the cost of maintaining the trees continue to drag Gloria down.

With little income Gloria has found it difficult to harvest enough crops to pay for her expenses and send her children to school, let alone have enough food to feed her family.

ADRA, through the Bono-Asante Atea (BAAT) project aims to make a difference in her life and that of nearly 6,000 other cashew nut farmers in Ghana. With funding provided by the European Commission and ADRA-UK, the next three years can potentially be life-changing for many who are barely surviving on growing cashew nuts.

Not only will ADRA teach farmers how to increase their crops by up to 30%, it will also link them to markets, teach climate change adaptation techniques and offer more employment within the cashew nut sector.

With many young people unable to find employment, ADRA is planning to create 'gangs' of young people who will provide important support services to the farmers. The 'gangs' will be organised teams of 6-8 young people who can be called on to help farmers with fertilisation, spraying insecticides and providing other shortterm support services. It is expected that at least 25 teams will be setup. Not only does it provide a service, but it establishes new employment.

Gloria is looking forward to the future and smiles when she is promised ADRA's help. Her future is a lot brighter and secure thanks to the work of

# Helping Farmers in eSwatini (Swaziland)



Thembani Dlamini, 57, is a talented farmer and runs a successful sweet potato business. Word is that she bakes the best sweet potato scones in her village!

But it hasn't always been like this. Thembani lives in Mpolonjeni area, a rural part of Lubombo, a beautiful yet severely droughtprone region of eSwatini (formerly Swaziland). She lives on a traditional homestead with her two teenage sons and daughter; having lost her husband several years ago. Like almost all families in the region, the 2016 drought hit them hard, and the failed maize crops (a key staple) meant that they struggled to put food on In 2017, Thembani got involved in ADRA's Enhanced Livelihoods for Smallholder Farmers (ELIVES) project, funded by the European Union. The project trains 400 farmers, 71% of which are women, in climate smart agriculture skills to increase their yields and promotes the planting of drought-tolerant crops, like sorghum, cow peas and sweet potatoes, rather than maize. This helps increase food security in these regions. In addition, farmers are trained in post-harvest management and food-processing to make sure they can preserve their harvest and make it last throughout the whole year.

Now, Thembani has a 0.4 hectare sweet potato nursery at her homestead, where she grows sweet potatoes for commercial purposes, and cultivates vines for the nearby Community Food and Nutrition Garden of which she is a member. She is a Lead Farmer, delivering training to a group of 13 others, and has a demonstration plot where

she grows sorghum and cowpeas, using this to teach her fellow farmers about the best ways to plant and harvest crops to increase the yield. She runs a sweet potato baking business from a nearby facility in the Mpolonjeni area. With the income she makes from her sweet potato business and selling other handmade goods. Thembani has been able to send her children to school and prepare nutritious food at home.

Thembani smiles as she can now see a future for her family that would not have been possible without ADRA's help and she is also able to share her knowledge with others.



### Around the world with ADRA

Five months into 2019 and we have seen numerous disasters - including the worst tropical storm on record to affect the southern African regions of Mozambique, Malawi, and Zimbabwe.

Cyclone Idai barrelled through Mozambique, Malawi, and Zimbabwe leaving more than 2.6 million victims in its devastating aftermath. The emergency management director for ADRA, Mario de Oliveiria, went as far as to comment that a cyclone, of this magnitude, is a rare occurrence in this part of the world. In Zimbabwe, ADRA was on the ground, helping hundreds of households with food and hygiene kits with plans to provide further assistance in hardest hit areas. Working in partnership with the UN, ADRA deployed 1000 shelter kits and 2000 tarps to Mozambique to assist the population in Beira – the hardest hit




area of Mozambique. And in Malawi, ADRA distributed clean water resources for 1,000 households to prevent the spread of disease, as well as shelter supplies, hygiene kits, and household items for more than 1,000 others. It was not long after Cyclone Idai devastated the southern parts of Africa that Cyclone Fani began making its way to an impoverished part of India. The aftermath left many in the Odisha state with no running water or electricity. Over 120,000 shelter kits were distributed in the coastal town of Puri in India where communities were hardest hit by Fani.


In response to the cyclones, ADRA has been able to provide immediate food and shelter, help heighten awareness of hygiene practices, and offer counselling services for those in mourning. In the wake of Idai and Fani we still need to remember that there are still unmet needs that linger for many people facing the aftermath of natural disasters around the world.

Through supporters like you, ADRA has been working closely with local and international authorities to assess the needs of the hardest hit communities and is doing so working in cooperation with local Adventist churches to provide aid.





#### The Borough of Newham, East London, is the UK's No. 1 homelessness hotspot.

ADRA-UK, through its I AM URBAN initiative, will partner with a leading mental health charity to combat poverty in the borough of Tower Hamlets through its PEDAL FORWARD project.

The project will provide up to 25 refurbished bicycles to people on lower incomes or who are unemployed living with mental health issues in collaboration with MIND in Tower Hamlets and Newham. The donated bicycles not only to the volunteer mechanics but to the beneficiaries.

The borough of Tower Hamlets has the highest worklessness rate in London is at 7.7%, and the highest rate of poverty at 39%. In the borough, child poverty is higher than in any other London borough and it is an area of high deprivation.

#### 'Cycling is a worthwhile activity that boasts many benefits to those who participate,'

said Bert Smit, CEO of ADRA-UK. 'It's also great for mental health, as well as being a participatory activity that can assist in improving socialisation', and we are pleased to be working with MIND on this this project.
