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Education Can't Wait!

Educating Myanmar's conflict-affected children

Despite the universally acknowledged value of education, a staggering 224 million children between the ages of 8 and 18 worldwide remain out of school. Nelson Mandela's words continue to resonate: "Education is the most powerful weapon you can use to change the world."

In Myanmar, children from indigenous communities' grapple with unprecedented obstacles to quality education. The COVID-19 pandemic triggered widespread school closures, and the February 2021 military coup escalated armed conflict, particularly in the ethnic states, displacing nearly one million people. Consequently, the percentage of children in education witnessed a substantial 12% decline from 2017 to 2023. reaching a worrisome 57%. This stark statistic translates to an estimated 8 million children currently lacking access to education.

The severity of this crisis prompted the UN Child Rights Committee to issue a grave warning, emphasizing that "time is running out to save Myanmar's stricken generation." Urgently, the committee called upon the international community to take swift action in protecting the country's children.

Despite these challenges, the prevailing sentiment from children, parents, and indigenous education providers in conflict-affected parts of Myanmar is an unwavering desire to continue their education. A local indigenous education provider passionately stated, "These are our people, these are our children. Despite the personal risks we take to provide education and keep our schools operational, we must do it for their future. If we don't, who will? Even if we have to teach them in trenches to hide from airstrikes or in the forest, we must continue; they are the present, they are the future."

In response to this, for the last five years, ADRA and a network of indigenous education providers, with the support of the European Union and your donations, have been implementing the CASE2Learn project. This initiative builds on ADRA's 35 years of experience working with local indigenous education providers in Myanmar. Through your support to ADRA-UK, this project has enhanced access to indigenous education services for over 330,000

children, improved teaching quality standards, supported effective school leadership, and equipped indigenous teachers with teaching competencies.

Lway, 22 years old, explained how she overcame her lack of confidence and inability to explain definitions to the children through vocational training conducted by the Case2Learn project. It is heart-warming to see young and inexperienced teachers rise to the challenge, standing confidently in front of a class, equipped with appropriate techniques to explain new concepts to the children in their mother tongue and expand their horizons. This dedication, amidst the armed conflict raging all around, is mirrored by parents and the communities at large, who actively engage in school-based activities.

When Production Booms

Dairy development in Zambia

From producing 6 litres of milk per day to producing 18 litres per day Mrs. Hamalila Mweemba Shindaile supports using right feeding materials for livestock.

"I learnt the hydroponic method where you can plant fodder and it is ready to feed the cows within 7 days of germination. Before adding hydroponic fodder as a supplement, I used to milk 6 litres from all three animals but now I milk 18 litres three (3) times more than what my family and I produced. I am happy with the results. I want to continue using these methods to ensure my animals are healthy and more productive meaning more income."

Through ADRA Zambia's dairy farming and hydroponic feed production training, Mrs. Shindaile, a farmer from Choma District, learned how to improve dairy operations by adopting best dairy farm practices and said she noticed that in a short space of time that the animals appeared healthier.

Mrs. Shindaile, who has been rearing cattle most of her life, said, "As a family we have been following traditional farming methods for generations, we were never exposed to modern dairy farm methods and technology, such as hydroponic feed production. So, this technology has changed my life

significantly, because it has contributed to the expansion of my business as I have even constructed a milking parlor on the farm."

Mrs. Shindaile is grateful to the Jersey Breeding Focus Dairy Development Zambia (JBFDDZ) project for helping her contribute to her family's income through the knowledge she gained from the training.

"I was so motivated that I thought it would be better to quit my full-time job and focus on the dairy business. The dairy project encouraged me to adopt hydroponic feed production which made me completely interested in raising and feeding my livestock, especially dairy cows, and calves."
